

## 1. CIRCUIT VILLA CRESPO

### 1. Templo Beit Jabad:

Serrano 69. In the 1930s, Jews of Polish origin met in the “Templo Ahavat Israel.” It wasn’t until 1945 that the Temple’s location was fixed on calle Serrano and the Temple was officially inaugurated.

### 2. Tzédek:

Serrano 333 / Lavalle 3333. Tzédek is a joint initiative of the Fundación Tzedaká which collects and distributes funds and donations to the various social programmes run by the Foundation.

### 3. Librería Sigal:

Av. Corrientes 2854. Tel: 4861-9501. Founded in 5690 (1930) by Simon Sigal, originally from Tzfat (Safed), Israel, this bookshop specialises in Spanish language books on the Torah, Talmud, Jewish traditions and history, and Hebrew. In 2003 the bookshop was declared a national heritage site (Librería de Valor Patrimonial) by the City Government.

### 4. Templo de la Calle Camargo (Asociación Comunidad Israelita Sefaradí):

Camargo 870. Inaugurated in 1919, this temple is unique in size and design. With a capacity of 800, it functions as a temple, a centre for Jewish studies, and a book and video library.

## 2. CIRCUIT BALVANERA

### 1. Gran Templo Paso:

Paso 423. Founded by Polish and Russian immigrants, Tthis temple was the first Jewish teaching institute in Argentina.

### 2. AMIA (Kehilá Judía de Buenos Aires):

Pasteur 633. AMIA (<http://www.amia.org.ar>) is a community centre for all Jews in Argentina, devoted to promoting Jewish values and providing information about Jewish activities in the country.

3. Monumento a las víctimas de la AMIA:

Pasteur 633. This monument was constructed in 1999 by Israeli sculptor and artist Yaacov Agam and pays homage to the 85 who died and many hundreds injured in the devastating bombing of the AMIA in 1994.

4. Plantación de árboles en memoria de las víctimas de la AMIA:

Pasteur between Avenida Corrientes and Avenida Córdoba. A set of trees in memory of the victims of the 1994 attack were planted along calle Pasteur in 1999.

5. Centro Comunitario Sucath David:

Tucumán 2750. In the heart of Once, a neighbourhood with a large Jewish population, this Community Centre offers neighbours a range of courses and activities for the whole community.

6. Congregación Sefaradí Yesod Hadat:

Lavalle 2449. This institution was founded by a group of Syrians from Aleppo, with a view to developing and promoting their customs and traditions. It contains a kindergarten, primary and secondary school, and also offers training for teachers and rabbis.
